Council Establishes a High School Scholarship Fund

The St. Irene Council has annually awarded a \$1000 scholarship to a St. Irene 8th grader who moves on to attend a Catholic High School. The award is competitive with a single scholarship awarded each year.

In 2021, spearheaded by **Bob** Ladeur, an additional \$1025 was raised with contributions from individuals and friends. A \$1000 was used to fund a second high school scholarship, leaving \$25 for a future award. In December \$1180 in memory of **Alta Halama** was donated to the fund. Most recently, **Ed Leahy** donated \$500 to the fund. The current balance is \$1705.

ProLife FDA Removed Restriction of Abortion Inducing Drugs

Kristan Hawkins, president of Students for Life, is calling the Food and Drug Administration's rollback of restrictions on abortion pills being prescribed by a telehealth provider "reckless" and "insane."

The pro-life advocate made her comments during an interview with Fox News on Thursday, December 16, 2021. Hawkins spoke after the FDA removed the requirement that mifepristone, the abortion-inducing drug, could only be prescribed in clinics, medical offices, and hospitals.

The easing of restrictions now permits women to receive prescriptions for abortions pills through a telehealth provider and have the drug mailed to them, Fox News said. Hawkins accused the Biden administration of not caring about "pre-born lives."

"I would say that this is a reckless decision that the FDA has said that came down today," she said. "It's a very sad day for women across America, not only for preborn children, but also for women. This is not a decision that was made for women or a woman's best interests at all.

"It is an insane decision that even a pro-abortion administration such as the Biden administration, we understand fully that they don't care about the value of pre-born lives. We understand their position. The U.S. solicitor general argued that in front of the Supreme Court just two weeks ago, but to put women's lives at risk just to further their cause and to think that they're doing some sort of end run around Roe v. Wade, it's a completely reckless and insane decision.

"This is a painful, dangerous type of abortion, which has a higher risk of complication than surgical abortion, which can lead to incomplete abortion, meaning you're going to have to go back at the risk of getting infected and possibly life-threatening infection." The Associated Press reported that the FDA first approved mifepristone in 2000 to terminate pregnancies up to 10 weeks. The outlet noted that nearly 40% of all abortions in the U.S. are now done through medication — rather than surgery.

The effect of the FDA rollback will vary depending on the state, the AP noted. More than a dozen states led by Republicans have passed measures limiting access to the pills and have outlawed delivery of them my mail.

I propose that the Council contribute a minimum of \$1000 to the fund each year in February. This then will increase the fund balance to \$2705. There is then a sufficient amount to award two \$1000 scholarships in May, 2022, leaving a balance of \$705.

By establishing the high school scholarship fund, it provides for formal recognition of contributions by our Council, individuals, and other organizations. We may be able to carry forward a precedence established by **Bob Ladeur** in 2021 by awarding two \$1000 scholarships each year. Depending on the fund balance, the Council will also have flexibility in the future to modify the scholarship amount and number of scholarships awarded each year.



Early-Bird Drawings: Drawings will be held virtually Jan. 30 & Feb. 6. Each entry can only win once during the early-bird drawings, but remains eligible for the drawings on Super Bowl Sunday, Feb. 13, 2022.

Raffle on Super Bowl Sunday: Prior to the start of the football game, for each respective pool 100 number pairs will be randomly assigned to each raffle ticket holder, from (0,0) through (9,9). During the football game, one cash prize will be awarded to the person holding the winning number pair each time a team scores; a touchdown plus points after constitutes one score. The winning number pair is comprised as follows: the least significant digit (right most digit) in the NFC team score constitutes the first number, and the least significant digit of the AFC team constitutes the second number in the pair. The cash prize amount is determined by a random drawing from the available cash prize pool. The remainder, if any, at the game's end will be awarded by random drawing of those raffle tickets not having a winning combination during the football game.

The pool of 17 cash prizes are based on 100 tickets sold for each pool. The number of cash prizes and the total cash amount awarded may be reduced to maintain the same winning odds (0.17) and 50% payout of ticket receipts. In the event of multiple raffles being conducted, cash prizes may be pooled. Fifty percent of the raffle ticket receipts will be used to support St. Irene Knights of Columbus programs.
